Child Development Program Profile



The Foothill College Child Development Department offers a high quality program that is designed to deepen understanding of children, their families, and developmentally appropriate practices for children from birth through elementary-school age. College-level coursework is designed to give you the opportunity to gain insight into children's behavior; build relationships with children, families and colleagues; and enhance the learning environment. Student teaching is offered in quality community programs under supervision of mentor teachers and faculty members from the Foothill College Child Development Department.

Foothill's Child Development Program prepares you for success in meeting individual career goals. Courses and specialty career certificates are designed to ensure that you:

- meet or exceed the hiring requirements for the level of work chosen;
- complete the requirements needed to obtain permits to become a child development assistant, associate teacher, teacher, master teacher and site supervisor in state-licensed, publicly funded, center-based child care and development programs; and
- are prepared to continue your education and earn a bachelor's degree.

The Foothill College Associate in Arts Degree in Child Development also allows you to transfer to a four-year college or university to pursue further studies in such fields as child development, human development, child psychology, social work, and elementary and special education. If you intend to transfer, review the specific requirements of the school to which you plan to transfer, and meet early and often with your Foothill College counselor to create your personalized educational plan to ensure that you achieve your academic goals.

Personal & Professional Qualities

To enjoy a successful, rewarding professional career in the field of early childhood education, you must demonstrate select personal and professional characteristics, including:

- Thorough understanding of child development,
- Knowledge of yourself and a dedication to learning,
- Emotional well-being and physical endurance,
- Creativity and a sense of humor,
- Flexibility and an appreciation of children's learning preferences,
- Ability to articulate clearly both verbally and in writing, and
- Commitment to excellence and ongoing professional development.

- Teaching in and/or directing a child development program for infants, toddlers, preschoolers, school-age children or children with special needs
- Operating a family-run child care business
- Parent/adult educator
- Childbirth educator

- Educational consultant
- Elementary-school instructional aide
- Early interventionist
- Speech therapist
- Recreational leader

The California Early Childhood Mentor Teacher Program is a statewide effort to improve the quality of child care. The program provides professional development opportunities for students who work in a classroom under the direction of a mentor teacher.

Child Development Training Consortium (CDTC) supports professional development through tuition reimbursement and Child Development Permit application fees.

In accordance with the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing and California Department of Education, Foothill College supports your effort to earn a child development permit. Specializations for the Master Teacher Permit include school-age emphasis; infant/toddler emphasis; preschool curriculum; and language and literacy.
