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We don't actually spend a lot of time in MIPC making decisions or discussing how to approach difficult problems. Most of the time is spent on information-sharing... What if instead MIPC was the place where we tackled difficult decision and problems, truly making use of the one governance space on campus that is meant for all constituency groups and college leadership to work together?



I see that minutes are posted on the MIPC website but I would like to see a digest of headlines of topics discussed with links to more information... I don't feel it's well organized in terms of transparency or access. It took me a while to find those minutes.



IEC Observations and Recommendations

- Communication: Elevate awareness of MIPC's role and operations across campus
- Decision-Making: Leverage MIPC platform for decisionmaking and strategic planning
- **Participation:** Foster a sense of belonging among attendees and those interested in becoming involved
