















The Latino immigrant experience is filled with stories of love, hardship and hope. The panel will discuss the highly divisive issue that immigration has become. In addition, the guest speakers will give voice to the current movement that is being labeled by the media and right-wing politicians, as one that is fighting for "immigrant rights." The goal of this discussion is to break down stereotypes and labels, and focus on the movement's goal of fighting for "human rights." Panelists include Dr. Ann Aurelia López, who holds a doctorate from the University of California, Santa Cruz; pro-immigrant activist Jose Sandoval; and Foothill College student and community leader F. Yoly Jimenez.

Dr. López recently completed a President's Postdoctoral Fellowship at the University of California, Berkeley. She has a long history of teaching environmental science, ecology and botany courses at San Jose City College. For years, Mr. Sandoval has focused on fighting toward equality for all. He has been recognized for his hard work trying to obtain driver licenses for immigrants as well as developing support for passage of the Dream Act. His effort in raising awareness of the issues the Latino community faces has united the community and gathered them to march. F. Yoly Jimenez is president of Latinos Unidos Caminando Hacia Adelante (LUCHA) and the Foothill College Latino Heritage Club. In response, the farmers formed a powerful union. Their leader is the Aymara Indian Evo Morales, and in 2005, this unwavering, unpretentious socialist made a historic bid for the presidency. A lively story about geopolitics, Indigenous culture, and one man's impressive determination, *Cocalero* follows Evo's campaign, getting up close and personal with the candidate and the union organization backing him, while presenting critical views of both. This shockingly objective documentary tells how the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and Cuban exiles have made 638 attempts on the life of Fidel Castro. Amazing archival footage and interviews with would-be assassins reveal the incredible cloak-and-dagger plots, from employing mafia heavies, to noxious gas and exploding cigars, and the bizarre lengths the United States has gone to trying to end communism in Cuba, including how John F. Kennedy asked lan Fleming, the creator of James Bond, for advice on ending the Castro regime. But perhaps most controversial are the clips of Florida Congresswoman Ileana Ros-Lehtinen welcoming just about anyone interested in assassinating Castro. This documentary, by Britain's Dollan Cannell, was initially screened in Cuba, only to be later banned for showing the revolutionary government in a bad light.
