Sal Garcia was an early staff member at the Galeria de la Raza in the Mission District in San Francisco, where he had the opportunity to curate numerous exhibitions. While working with Galeria, he acquired the honorary nickname "Mayor of 24th Street" where his studio was a prominent meeting place for local artists, activists and many out-of-town visitors such as Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Rigoberta Menchú. Noted for his unique use of color, Sal Garcia is an artist of unusual range, working in painting, printmaking, sculpture and woodcarving. Movement and light are also very important in his technique and reflect his early exposure to the work of the Mexican master Siquieros at Taller Siquieros in Cuernavaca, Mexico. Garcia's travels through Mexico, North Africa, Spain, Italy, Japan and

through Mexico, North Africa, Spain, Italy, Japan and China have informed his work and helped create his global perspectives. He has found art to be a path of expression that combines his interests in the spiritual as well as the political. His art varies in composition but is strongly influenced by Pre-Columbian themes.

Throughout his career, Garcia has been involved in numerous art shows and creative projects. His art has been exhibited from Manhattan to Moscow to Mexico City. His work is in numerous public and private collections,

including those of the Mexican Museum and musician Carlos Santana.

His works are on display in the Foothill College Semans Library Gallery throughout May. Exhibit admission is free; on-campus parking is \$2. Gallery hours are Mondays through Thursdays, 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.; and Fridays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
